WHAT ARE YOU TRYING TO ACCOMPLISH WITH YOUR LITERATURE SEARCHES?

- Are you exploring an <u>idea</u> for research or a project?
 - Gaining background knowledge
 - Attempting to find gaps in the literature
 - Discovering how others might have approached a topic or measured an outcome
- Are you performing the <u>research</u> itself?
 - Systematic review, meta-analysis, scoping review
- Are you in the <u>writing</u> process already and need some additional references?
 - Editorials, commentaries, etc.



WHAT ARE YOU WRITING?

- Systematic Research Project robust methodology and determined a priori
 - Systematic Review
 - Meta-analysis
 - Scoping review

- Journal and Article Type
 - Often determines reference limit and citation style


WHAT'S YOUR PLAN TO STAY ORGANIZED?

- ANSWER: Reference Management Software (more from Dr. Margolis)
 - Bare bones expectation if you don't use software: Use your own system with place holders (e.g., brackets with highlights; [Smith 2012]). Do not number superscripts until the very end when using AMA style.
- Why? MAJOR Time Saver browser plug-ins, word processor add-ons, building/sharing libraries, and MUCH more
- As you collect information and synthesize/organize, have a method for keeping track of which reference goes with which information (again, RMS can help!)
- If you're doing a systematic research project, there are more sophisticated tools

LITERATURE SEARCHING CONSIDERATIONS

- Primary, secondary, tertiary and hierarchy of evidence
- Reputable
- Search more than one database (there is more than PubMed®!)
- Use tutorials, FAQs, user guides, etc.
- Google Power Searching and grey literature
- Lean on your librarians!
- Don't reference anything you haven't read in its entirety
