Purpose of a paragraph

- Develops ONE main idea through a series of related sentences
- A framework for organizing ideas in a logical order
- Guide the reader through your written work

Sentences that Structure a Paragraph

Topic Sentence (TS) - the beginning

- •Needs to state ONE idea clearly
- •Useful Tip: Always put the most important information first!

Supporting Sentences (SS) - the middle

- •Elaborates and explains the idea introduced in the topic sentence
- •Provides evidence and examples
- •Explains the evidence or example included why is it relevant?

Concluding Sentence (CS) - the end

•Makes links: back to the main idea of the paragraph; back to research question or topic of the assignment; to the next paragraph

Example

As health care becomes more patient centered, an increased value is placed on humanistic outcomes, such as quality of life and patient satisfaction. Warfarin, historically the primary anticoagulant for the treatment and prevention of thromboembolic events, has a narrow therapeutic window requiring frequent monitoring of the international normalized ratio (INR) for safety and efficacy. Extending the interval for INR monitoring in patients on stable doses of warfarin could be a strategy to improve patient satisfaction because many health care systems monitor the INR at least every 4 weeks. As a grade 2B recommendation (weak recommendation based on moderate evidence), the 2012 American College of Chest Physician guidelines suggest an INR follow-up interval of up to 12 weeks in patients on stable doses of warfarin. However, the limited data available suggests no net benefit in patient satisfaction regarding the extension of the INR follow-up interval to 12 weeks. 12

Elements in Writing a Good Paragraph

- Element #1: Unity
- Element #2: Order
- Element #3: Coherence
 - Verb tense and point of view
- Element #4: Completeness

Transitions

- Tie together ideas or paragraphs, connecting them to form a coherent idea
- Phrases that show:
 - Order (first, second, next, finally)
 - Spatial relationships (above, below, following)
 - Logic (furthermore, in addition, moreover)
- Makes for a smoother, more pleasant reading experience

When to start a New Paragraph

- A paragraph break is necessary when:
 - Starting a new topic
 - Contrasting points of view or ideas
 - Providing white space to give readers a pause from a longer paragraph
- Paragraph breaks control the pace of writing/reading
- No set number of sentences required per paragraph
- Ensure your central idea is supported and ensure your audience is not overwhelmed

Other Tips and Tricks

- Outline your ideas first
- Don't judge your initial writing just put "pen to paper"
- If slowing down, take a break to review your work
- Review from different lenses (grammar/spelling, citations)
- Ask an independent party to review
